America Must Serve The LORD!

On November 4th, we will elect a new president. Senator John McCain (Republican) and Senator Barack Obama (Progressive Democrat) will be on the ballot. There are some very important differences between them. Here are a few:

John McCain is pro-life.

Barack Obama is pro-abortion and pro-partial birth abortion.

John McCain has over 20 years of experience in government.

Barack Obama spent only 25 months as a U.S. senator before running for president.

John McCain does not want to raise taxes.

Barack Obama does.

John McCain has served honorably in the U.S. military and suffered as a prisoner of war.

Barack Obama has stated that he believed that the Washington, D.C. gun ban was constitutional. However, after the recent Supreme Court decision overturning the gun ban, Mr. Obama said that he agreed with the court. He is still against citizens being able to carry concealed weapons.

John McCain is for "traditional marriage" (marriage between a man and a woman ONLY). Barack Obama is for "traditional marriage," but he is also a strong advocate for "same sex civil unions" that would give same sex couples, according to Obama, "...all the benefits that are available for a legally sanctioned marriage." He has also vowed, if elected, to repeal the Defense of Marriage Act.

On Senator Obama's web site under the issue "Faith," one paragraph reads: "Senator Obama has laid down principles for how to discuss faith in a pluralistic society, including the need for religious people to translate their concerns into universal, rather than religion-specific, values during public debate."
